Welcome to the first edition of our newly launched monthly newsletter for the Woodland Cemetery Preservation Project. This newsletter will keep you informed about our recent and future activities, events, and research findings about this sacred space. Between July 2020 and January 2021 ground penetrating radar revealed 667 unmarked burials in Clemson University's Woodland Cemetery believed to belong to Africans and African Americans and dating to the antebellum era. This project intends to uncover the histories of the known and unknown burials in Woodland Cemetery and to properly commemorate all who are buried at this historic site.

As the research and community engagement team at Clemson works to recover the history of this burial ground, we have invited scholars, community members, and professionals to discuss and engage



in conversations with the public about historic cemeteries and the university. Presenters will discuss archaeology, cemeteries, engaging campus community stakeholders, collaborative archival research, storytelling and memorialization, historical markers and monuments, restorative justice and community engagement. We will also be debuting a virtual introduction to Clemson's Woodland Cemetery and African American Burial Ground at noon that day.



# **Creative Inquiry Class**

This Fall Dr. Sara Collini is leading a team of undergraduate students in the class Creative Inquiry in History: The Woodland Cemetery Preservation and Memorial Project. The 15 undergraduate students in the class represent a diverse range of majors and colleges from across the campus community. The students will conduct research and participate in community engagement activities to assist with the development of the preservation plan and memorial for Woodland Cemetery. Some of these activities include completing genealogy research, doing archival research, conducting historical tours, creating social media posts, and writing biographical narratives.

- Judge Crawford, an African American employee who worked at Clemson for 57 years.
- Carrel Cowan-Ricks, an African American archaeologist who worked at Clemson and studied the cemetery from 1990-1993
- President Walter Riggs, a former Clemson President who first proposed creating Woodland Cemetery in 1923.
- Sergeant & Mrs. Stern, a husband and wife who were the first persons to be buried in Woodland Cemetery.
