HOW TO PLANT YOUR TREE

Select your planting site carefully. Keep in mind that as your tree grows the roots and branches will spread; so allow adequate space for future growth.

Dig a hole twice as wide as the root system but not any deeper, the root flare showing above grade. If compost or amendments are used mix well with the native soil. Put two inches of mulch over the planted area using compost or straw a few inches from the trunk. Fertilizer is not usually needed in the first year.

Newly planted trees need regular watering during the first year-spring, summer, and fall. Evergreens, because they retain their leaves, need to be watered regularly in the winter too. Do not water every day. Instead give your trees a good soaking once a week.

DESCRIPTIONS AND PRICING FOR FRUIT TREES & ORNAMENTAL FLOWERING TREES

APPLES - \$18.00 each

Anna: A hybrid cross with Golden Delicious, the same sweet flavor. Fruit is large, green with blushed red color. Ripens late June/July. *Needs a pollinator such as Ein Shemer or Dorsett Golden.

Ein Shemer: A sweeter apple than Anna, yellow fruit, excellent for eating fresh, making pies, sauce or cider. Ripens late June/July. *Needs a pollinator such as Anna or Dorsett Golden.

Dorsett Golden: Resembles Yellow Delicious and is similar in flavor but is often seedless. Ripens in the Fall.

Granny Smith: Medium to large, waxy, grassy-green, crisp and tart, and an excellent keeper. Excellent quality eating and cooking apple. Self-pollinator.

Mutsu (Also known as Crispin): This apple is both spicy and juicy. The fruit is large, great-tasting, greenish-yellow with a red blush, tart, crisp. It is excellent for fresh eating, sauces, pies, and baking. This apple stores and keeps well. *Needs a pollinator.

Apple trees are susceptible to a variety of pests and diseases, but are very rewarding when properly cared for.

BLUEBERRIES - \$15.00 each

Powder Blue: The standard among rabbiteye blueberries. Plants are upright and vigorous. Has good quality, appearance, and high yield. Medium, light-blueberries maintain quality on bush. Excellent choice for landscape plantings due to attractive fall color. Ripens in mid-June.

Woodward: Medium-sized plants. Are early in ripening. Have large, light blue, high quality fruit with small soft seeds. Woodward fruit has been rated high for dessert quality.

Climax: One of the earliest ripening varieties. Upright growth. Most of the berries ripens at one time. Medium, dark blue fruit. Good pollinator. Beautiful fall color. Harvest begins in late May through early June.

Premier: Popular for home gardens. Early ripening, high yielder. Vigorous plant. Large, bright blue fruit of excellent quality. Ripens in mid-June.

* Plant two or more varieties of blueberries for better pollination

CREPE MYRTLES - \$18.00 each

Red, Purple, Peppermint: Profuse summer flowering shrub, blooms June to frost. Needs a sunny location. At maturity will reach 10-30 ft.

BLACKBERRIES - \$15.00 each (Thornless/Self-Pollinators)

Arapaho: Very erect and suckers free. Fruit: good quality, mediumsize, firm, stores and ships well. Has a short picking period. Earliest ripening thornless variety. Ripens early in May.

Navaho: Erect thorn-free canes make picking a pleasure. Medium size berries of good quality; moderate to high productivity. Stores well. Good quality and production, although yields not as much as thorny varieties. Ripens in June.

Black Satin: Semi-erect. Small to medium fruit. Excellent for jams, jellies, pies, and fresh eating. They also keep well. Fair quality, good producer.

Hull: Semi-erect, requires trellis. Large, oblong fruit. Highly productive, ripens late June to early July. Good for processing; vigorous and relatively disease-free.

FIGS - \$18.00 each

Brown Turkey: Bell-shaped fig, excellent flavor. Tree bears two crops each season. If injured by freezing, may still produce on sucker wood next season. Self-pollinator.

Celeste: An exceptionally sweet-flavored fig, superior fresh-fruit quality. More cold tolerant than other varieties. Self-pollinator.

PEARS - \$18.00 each

Keiffer: Large, greenish-yellow fruit, firm, juicy, moderately gritty flesh. Cooks well. Tree is disease-resistant and a consistent bearer. Ripens late September/October. *Requires Orient for cross-pollination.

Orient: Firm, juicy, sweet, nearly round yellow fruit. Tree is upright and attractive in the landscape, is fire blight resistant, and ripens early September. No pollinator needed.

Moonglow: Fruit is large, attractive, with soft, juicy flesh, few grit cells. Flavor is mild, sub-acid, rated good. Has good dessert qualities but best for processing. Tree is vigorous, upright in growth habit, heavily spurred. Fruits at an early age and appears to be tolerant to fire blight. Ripens early August.

CRABAPPLES - \$20.00 each

Pink, Red: Substitute for Dogwood in sunny locations. Flowers in April. Moderate growth rate. Mature size is 15-25 feet with 10-20 feet spread.

PECANS - \$43.00 each

Elliott & Pawnee need Cape Fear as a pollinator. Pawnee works well in a variety of soil types, easily crackable, and has a high yield.

PEACHES - \$ 18.00 each

Maygold: A clingstone variety, good to eat fresh. Fruit has reddish skin and yellow flesh. Ripens mid-spring. No cross pollination required.

Sam Houston: Best Lowcounty variety. Yellow freestone, firm flesh especially good for eating fresh. Ripens mid-spring. *Needs pollinator

Suwanee: Freestone, some tendency to split. Fruit is yellow; firm flesh, fine textured, good flavor. Ripens mid-summer. Self-fertile.

PERSIMMONS - \$34.00 each

Fuyu Japanese: Medium size, non-astringent persimmon. The fruit is red, rather flattened, square-shaped and can be eaten green. It is sweet and delicious when it has become orange-red and is still firm.

PLUMS - \$18.00 each

Bruce: Produces large wine-red fruit, rich flavor, red flesh. Good for canning. Fruits at early age, early summer. Needs pollinator.

Burbank: Heavy producer, large purple-red fruit with sweet, yellow flesh. Good for eating fresh. Harvest begins in late May through early June.

Methley: Medium fruit, red-purple skin, amber flesh. Vigorous grower, sweet flavor. Good for eating fresh. Ripens early summer. Self pollinator. Will cross pollinate with Bruce or Burbank yielder. Vigorous plant. Large, bright blue fruit.

DOGWOODS - \$26.00 each

White- Loveliest of all native trees. Pink - Excellent contrast tree for larger evergreen backgrounds.

FLOWERING SHRUBS

Red Flowering Quince \$18.00 Provide the first pop of color into the yard in the spring. Can grow to a height of 6 to 10 ft. Full sun.

Magnolia Niagara \$22.00 Purple blooms. Full sun, Plenty of space, acidic soil.

Calycanthus - \$14.00 Will grow to a large shrub reaching a height of 3-9 feet tall and 6 to 12 feet wide. Plants grown in full sun will be smaller than those grown in part shade. The plants provide beautiful flowers in April and May with an astounding fragrance.

These plants are BARE ROOT specimens. They have been carefully selected and inspected; however, there is no guarantee on livability. If they are planted according to instructions and are not allowed to dry out, you should have few problems. It is most important to get the trees planted soon after they arrive.
